One or two day workshops will qualify as a one credit equivalent offering when there is sufficient required pre-workshop study or post workshop follow-up assignments equivalent to the additional hours of outside preparation implied in the above credit ratios. Narrative evaluations are required, if credit equivalent is awarded to workshop.

NONSTOP LIBERAL ARTS INSTITUTE is currently not accredited. Nonstop courses are not accredited. Course credit equivalents have been assigned.

REGISTRATION: Students may earn equivalent credit for several types of courses. Students are expected to be registered prior to the first day of class, at which time payment arrangements need to be satisfied. Scheduled courses: These are the courses which are being offered during the term and which appear in the published course schedule. Independent Study courses: Independent study courses are ad hoc courses designed by the student and a regular full-time faculty member. An independent study course syllabus must be submitted at the time of registration and may be taken as part of a regular study term or as academic credit over co-op, if approved. The approval and signatures of the instructor in which the course is classified is required. All independent study courses are designated with the course number 196, 296, or 396, depending on the level of study involved. Students are expected to complete at least three hours of work per week for each credit hour registered.

Combination: Half-time Study/Half-time Co-op:

Students may register and earn up to eight academic credits during a half-time co-op term. Academic courses can be done by arrangement with Nonstop faculty as a course pursued on an independent study basis or as a regular course, if the student's co-op is located near Yellow Springs.

Adding and Dropping Courses:

The Add/Drop period of academic registration lasts for one week following the first day of class at the beginning of the term. During the Add/Drop period, students are permitted to add and drop courses from their registration. The signature of the instructor whose class is being added is required.

Rolling registration on workshops will continue until the first day of class at which time will be final, no refund.

Withdrawing from Courses:

After the Add/Drop period, requests to add a course are reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Students may formally withdraw from a course after the Add/Drop period through the end of the second week with refund.

Course Prerequisites:

Some courses require students to possess a certain body of prior knowledge before taking them. Any course listed as prerequisite to another must be completed before taking the advanced course. If a student wishes to have a prerequisite course waived, the student may be able to test out of the course by having the faculty member administer an appropriate test or to obtain the instructor's permission to register for the course, thus instructor signature required on Drop/Add form to be submitted to Registrar's Office. No credit is granted for such a test or for waiving a prerequisite course.

Credit Load:

12 equivalent credits is considered full-time. Students are permitted to register and earn 19 credits during each term. A student wanting to register for additional credits, maximum 22 must submit overcredit petition to Registrar. The Curriculum Committee will review such requests at the beginning of each term.

Auditing:

Courses may be registered for credit or audit. Audits must be requested from the faculty on a course by course basis and at the discretion of the instructor. Refer to audit policy in course syllabus. Same fees apply. Narrative evaluations will be written for those registered for credit.

ACADEMIC CREDIT & EVALUATION:

Academic credit is expressed in equivalent semester credits. One credit is assigned to a class that meets 50 minutes per week for 15 weeks. Attendance required of students at all regularly scheduled classes.

Crediting:

The following standards of assessment apply to courses:
CR-Credit: Satisfactory completion of requirements.
NC-No Credit: Unsatisfactory completion of requirements.
AUDIT: Course not taken for credit.

INCOMPLETES WILL NOT BE GRANTED.

Evaluations:

Evaluation is the process by which an instructor and student inform one another of what they are learning. Student self-evaluations are to be submitted to the course instructor prior to the last day of the class to be added to the narrative evaluation submitted to the Registrar at the end of the semester.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS & PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act of 1974 grants to students certain rights, privileges, and protections relative to individually identifiable student education records, which are maintained by Nonstop. Specifically: (1) Students' educational records (with the exception of directory information) will be released to third parties outside Nonstop only with the written consent of the student. See Authorization to Disclose Academic Information Form. (2) Students have the right to inspect their own educational records, which are available at Nonstop headquarters. (3) Students have the right to challenge the content of their records.

Directory Information:

FERPA permits the release of Directory information to third parties outside the institution without written consent of the student, provided the student has been given the opportunity to withhold such disclosure. Nonstop defines Directory information to include student's name, dates of attendance, withdrawal dates. You also may request at any time that Directory information be withheld for the term by informing the Registrar's Office in writing of your request. This must be done once a year and is only good for the academic year in progress.

Please consider very carefully the consequences of any decision by you to withhold Directory information. Should you decide to inform Nonstop not to release Directory information, any request for such information from non-institutional persons or organizations will be refused for the remainder of the current academic year.

COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

Most courses are offered for 3 equivalent credits. The specific number of credits is indicated in the schedule of courses published.

TUITION AND FEES FOR COURSES:

Nonstop Liberal Arts Institute tuition will be \$1500, or \$100 per credit equivalent. Students will pay according to their ability with the minimum payment of:

- \$300 paid by full-time students (12-19 credit equivalents)
- \$150 paid by half-time students (6-11 credit equivalents)
- \$50 paid by part-time students (1-5 credit equivalents)

INDIVIDUAL WORKSHOP FEES:

- Half-day/no credit workshop \$30.00.
- One-day/no credit workshop \$50.00.
- Multi-day/one equivalent credit workshop \$100.00.
